People of Bethlehem,

As the weather has been warming up and the sunsets are later in the day (this is the one & only silver lining I

can ever find to the spring time change), I'm finding myself more often out in my backyard. At our house this spring we've been planting beautiful potted flowers and we've started growing vegetables and milkweed plants from seed. Perhaps you, too, are planting new things this season, watering, and hoping and praying for growth.

This kind of work and patience often brings to my mind one of my favorite passages from 1 Corinthians, verses 5-9: "What then is Apollos? What is Paul? Servants through whom you came to believe, as the Lord assigned to each. I planted, Apollos watered, but God gave the growth. So neither the one who plants nor the one who waters is anything, but only God who gives the growth. The one who plants and the one who waters have a common purpose, and each will receive wages according to the labor of each. For we are God's servants, working together; you are God's field, God's building."

On my mind is not so much the idea of church division (as this verse also addresses), but on the idea of who brings the growth about from our work. These days we have done much planting and watering in new and different ways and we have much planting and watering ahead of us as well. Some seeds may sprout and bring much fruit, while other ways of planting and watering may turn out not to be as fruitful as we expected. However, we are all God's servants, working together, finding new ways to love one another, new ways to share the Gospel message, new ways to worship, and new ways to care for creation. We trust and pray that as we plant and water, we stay focused on that common unity that we have in our Christian identity and we remember that it is God who has brought us growth and goodness in the past and as we work together, it is God who will work through us and bless others through our efforts.

MARCH COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

In reviewing the various unexpected ways that challenges have been met this past year, I cannot help but thank God for answered prayer and all the blessings Bethlehem has enjoyed. How this church has continued to provide worship options, outreach, service to community, education and fellowship—in spite of all that worked against those things—is nothing short of miraculous! As I hear the report each month of below budget offerings, a prayer of St. Augustine has been on my mind and I commend it to you: Pray as if everything depends on God; work as if everything depends on you.

COUNCIL ACTIONS:

- Voted to recommend to the congregation that Rey-Crest be hired for the roof repair and Mount Air for HVAC (heating, ventilation, air conditioning) repair and, further, that money be taken from the Faithful Stewards Endowment Fund for a total not to exceed \$100,000 for the roof and \$40,000 for the HVAC.
- 2. Scheduled a special meeting of the congregation for **Sunday, April 11** after the second service to vote on the Council's recommendation to repair the roof and HVAC system.
- 3. Voted to donate a \$55 credit from last year's (cancelled) Synod Assembly to the Synod to assist underfunded congregations.

MANAGEMENT:

- 1. Reviewed three bids for roof and HVAC repair projects and method of payment.
- 2. The Worship and Music team will move the in-person 9 a.m. worship service indoors beginning April 11 and change the time to 11 a.m.
- 3. Budget variances were approved and covered by a \$6,000 credit card cash back reward.
- 4. The second Paycheck Protection Program loan (\$219,000) was approved and is already in use; still awaiting approval of forgiveness for the first PPP loan (\$197,000).
- 5. Thrivent Choice donations were received.
- February offerings were below budget.

MINISTRY:

- 1. The youth raised \$406 from the See's candy fundraiser for their trip to the National Youth Gathering.
- There was a great collection for Easter at Hope Gardens; Girls Scouts are assembling them.
- Pr. Megan and staff put together Easter egg gifts to be delivered to members.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Hello Members and Friends of Bethlehem Lutheran,

This is an exciting time, as we plan for the reopening of indoor services on Sunday, April 11 at 11:00 a.m. at Bethlehem. For many of us, this will be a welcomed change to outdoor services, which we have had over the last months. As we move indoors for worship, we will be at a limited capacity, due to the Los Angeles County restriction and Social Distancing requirements of 6 feet. Our capacity will be approximate 18 persons or households, due to the 6 ft. restrictions. Our live streaming will remain at 10:00 a.m. on Sunday, as well. The choice about worshipping in person or through the live stream is up to each individual person and family. We thank the reopening committee for their leadership through the last year. As we move toward April 11, we will need those members that feel comfortable being in the Sanctuary to also assist with Greeting, Ushering and Cleaning and Sanitizing the Church for use.

This has also been an eventful two months since I assumed the position of President. The two major priorities the Council has been working on are the repair of the roofs over Chandler Hall and the Preschool Buildings, which have been leaking and unsuccessfully repaired over the last few years, and the replacement of the HVAC unit in the Sanctuary, which was damaged in the fire on February 14.

We have obtained three bids for the costs of the roof repairs and they have been reviewed by the Church Council and a Roof Contractor has been approved for recommendation to the Congregation. We have also received a bid for the replacement of the HVAC Unit over the Sanctuary and the Council has reviewed and approved the bid and for recommendation to the Congregation.

Both of the Roof Repair and HVAC unit replacement exceed the amount budgeted for the Maintenance and Repair line item approved in the 2020/2021 Budget. The Council has reviewed the Church's financial condition and fortunately due the Payroll Protection Program (PPP) loans, of which, we were blessed to receive two, one for \$197,000.00 and a second for \$218,000.00, we did not have to use our Faithful Stewards' Endowment Allocation for the 2019-2020 Fiscal Year. At the most recent Faithful Stewards' Committee meeting, the committee members have graciously authorized use of the Endowment Funds for the Roof and HVAC unit repair and replacement.

The Bylaws of the Faithful Stewards' Endowment Fund requires approval of the Church's Congregation to spend any funds over \$15,000.00 on any one item and the Church Constitution requires Congregational approval on any items \$10,000.00 over the amount budgeted.

Since the roof and HVAC repairs need to be done, as soon as possible, I will be calling a Special Congregation Meeting on Sunday, April 11, 2021, at 12:00 p.m., following the 11:00 a.m. indoor worship service. This will make our first Sunday back in the Sanctuary a very busy one, but we are hoping to start the repair at the end of April or beginning of May. The meeting will be held both in person and on Zoom for the convenience of all members. The notification of the meeting was sent out by mail and email to all members of the Church on March 29, and the Agenda was available starting Sunday, March 28 and will be available on Sunday, April 4 and on April 11.

Please stay safe and healthy and I look forward to seeing you all soon. Blessings.

- Fast from all digital devices and social media
- · Eat dinner in the dark on Good Friday
- Buy nothing for three days
- Fill empty eggshells with soil, seeds, and water, and place them in a sunny window
- Make hot crossed buns
- Make holy water in your house by blessing it first and then drawing a cross on everyone's forehead, saying with a smile, "Bless this mess!"



News From Lutheran Social Services

Lutheran Social Services of Southern California is one of the Los Angeles Regional Food Bank's Agency Partners in a network of about 700 organizations. Area director for LSSSC/San Fernando Valley, Jan Maseda, opens up about her 20-year experience in a virtual interview with the Food Bank on Zoom. Jan discusses the people she's been able to help, including those experiencing homelessness locally, children of families enrolled in Early Start Programs, and more recently, those who have lost their jobs due to COVID-19 and college students sleeping in their cars and going hungry.

In Helping Others, You Help Yourself

Jan, who officially retired in 2014 a total of 3 times, stepped in as the Director, as LSSSC needed one. It could be a myriad of reasons Jan finds herself back on the frontline: her guiding principles in how she approaches being of service to others include kindness, compassion, trying to walk in the shoes of others, empowering others, embracing people and trying to help.



"It is a very humbling experience to help people, and that's been my life's work: helping people. In different avenues, but this avenue seems like God put me here."

The mission of LSSSC is to serve low income, no income and those experiencing homelessness in the North Hollywood and San Fernando Valley areas of LA County. She feels that LA Regional Food Bank and programs are all acts of service for God.

The Guiding Light: Helping

Jan is back in her Director role because, in her 20 years, there doesn't seem to be a time where we could go out of business as a food bank – ever, she says. She says she hasn't seen a decrease in the number of homeless people or those who are food insecure with COVID-19 making it worse, especially in Los Angeles County, where every 1 in 4 people may not know where their next meal is coming from.

"There's just never enough food banks, never enough organizations willing to step up and help people. Never enough volunteers or enough food. We closed three times in March and April for lack of food because the pandemic broke the supply chain. If there's no food at Ralph's because people are [panic] buying, there's no food that trickles down to agencies such as ours also. So that was a big surprise – I don't think we've witnessed something like that like no toilet paper, no hand sanitizers and no canned goods in our stores in my lifetime. It was a surprise for food banks that this could happen in America."

In Jan's innate helpful nature, the LSSSC can rely on her as their Director. Many families have never been to a food bank before, and there's a little bit of a stigma attached to it, she says. "We try to make them feel as comfortable as possible and show them that there is no stigma here and all we want to do is give you food."

Their operations have shifted to adhere to Public Health Guidelines to ensure everyone's safety is how LSSSC now distributes their food pantry offerings. Before, people were welcome to come inside and to browse through the items according to their preferences.

"We found that was empowering for people – to be able to just shop like a normal person in our food pantry. We have a huge selection, and we don't like packing for them because we may not know their cultural background or dietary restrictions or preferences. We like to be able to offer that to them (the choice) – as one of our guiding principles of helping them and empowering them to get what they want and eat what they want

and not just feel like they were taking a hand out. And we're hoping that changes soon where we can live without COVID."

The pandemic has further changed other aspects of the agency: offering more than food, LSSSC also offers a closet full of clothes and shoes for children, women and men, and blankets for the homeless that now functions outside, they've had to let almost all of their volunteers, developmentally delayed adults that normally come in and sort the food, go and have since been able to have them back.

They have also seen an increase in the number of people that seek assistance in their food pantry by about 25-30% – making it very tough for the organization to maintain operations with higher demand and increased resources.

"It's become much more challenging but we have noticed that the community has really stepped up to the plate also through donations of everything — from food and clothes and they would give their time and energy if they could too. I'm hoping other organizations have experienced the same thing we have.

Apart but Together

Lutheran Social Services of Southern California also shares whatever resources they have through the San Fernando Valley. With the region being so big, there are several food pantries in the area and they serve whatever the demographics are, Jan explains. They used to serve the population in Van Nuys where the organization was located and where there happened to be a lot more homeless people there and they served that area for 15 years, she says. Now the organization is doing more family work as there is a magnet school across from them and a Head Start program on their property so they provide help for a lot of kids and their families.

Through her years and experience, she has developed and cultivated strong relationships throughout the community of agencies like hers.

"If we have an abundance of blankets, or socks or whatever the item may be, we'll reach out to an organization that may be serving a homeless population and we'll share with them. It's nice to have a coalition here – from churches, temples, and everybody trying to serve people who really need the help. It's nice to have that coalition and to share each other's bounty."

A Life Spent Fighting Food Insecurity

In her experience, Jan says that it is still surprising to see the need around food insecurity never go away in her 20 years and it's only gotten worse, especially with the pandemic and its economic downturn impacting all walks of life. She says that the things most people don't realize about food insecurity are food-insecure children who are suffering amidst school closures and parents coping with job loss and cut hours and a whole population of college students are food insecure.

"A lot of us live a life, not necessarily in a bubble, but a certain type of life where we don't experience food insecurity and it's tough to understand how people in America can be going hungry."

"I really want to express my gratitude to the Los Angeles Regional Food Bank. We wouldn't be here without you. I'm sure other agencies say that and we are blessed that we have the support of so many other organizations, churches, our councilmembers and LA City council."

It is with your help and support, the Food Bank is able to provide critical goods – food and grocery products – to agency partners like Lutheran Social Services of Southern California and the food-insecure children, seniors, families and individuals that rely on them. <u>Join</u> the fight against hunger today.
